# I Samuel 23: 15-34 and chapter 24 - Catherine Taylor

Grace can be defined as courteous good-will, to do honor or credit to someone or something by one's presence or, undeserved favor. It seems to me that David exhibited all three of these qualities in his interactions with Saul.

#### Locations

**Keilah** – The Citadel – The earliest historical record of Keilah is found in the <u>Amarna letters</u> from the <u>14th century BCE</u>. In some of them, Qeilah and her king Shuwardatha are mentioned. It is possible to infer from them the importance of this city among the cities of <u>Canaan</u> that bordered near Egypt before the conquest of Canaan by the Israelites.

According to the <u>First Book of Samuel</u>, the <u>Philistines</u> had made an inroad eastward as far as Keilah and had begun to appropriate the country for themselves by plundering its granaries until <u>David</u> prevented them.

**The Wilderness of Ziph** – Ziph (Romanized Zip)was a town in the <u>Judean</u> <u>Mountains</u> south-east of <u>Hebron</u>. Here <u>David</u> hid himself from <u>Saul</u> (<u>Psalm 54</u>). The name of <u>Zif</u> is found about four miles south of <u>Hebron</u>, attached to a rounded hill of some 100 feet in height, which is called Tell Zif.

**Horesh** – The name means "forest". It was located in the Wilderness of Ziph. There's disagreement about any other possible information.

**Maon** – in the Arabah south of the desert. The rift valley is along the edge of the Dean Sea – and I of course wonder about the significance of that.

**En Gedi** - means "the spring of the kid goat" in Hebrew, is a desert oasis on the western shore of the Dead Sea that appears in the Bible many times. The oasis is known for its beauty and natural resources and has been home to people for thousands of years. It features waterfalls, pools, streams, and two freshwater springs, one of which is the only one along the Dead Sea's western shore. The area is also home to a variety of wildlife, including deer, rabbits, leopards, and ibex, as well as exotic birds and beautiful foliage.

### Lenses -

**<u>Epho</u>d** - an elaborate garment worn by the high priest, and upon which the Priestly breastplate containing the Urim and Thummim rested.

### Names of God

*God – lohim – majesty –* plural in form; singular in meaning.

Lord God – Yahweh – the personal or covenant God. Indicates relationship
